Submission guidelines

Articles may be submitted to **JCOM** for publication at any time. Any science communication - related topic is acceptable.

Papers must be submitted via the Internet from the link "[to submit](#)".

Files should be submitted in open-source formats. Microsoft Word or Rich Text Format are also accepted. Zipped archives containing many files are preferred. Submitted articles will not be returned. Authors should retain an original copy. Acknowledgement of receipt will be sent by e-mail.

All articles will be reviewed by the editors and at least two referees. The decision of the editors and the referees' reviews will be returned by e-mail.

Language

Authors can write in their mother tongue. Title and abstract should also be written in English. The whole article will both be published in the language used by the author and in English.

Length

Maximum length: 7500-words plus a 150-words abstract.

Papers should include a short biography of the author(s), not longer than 80 words.

Articles should include keywords (from a minimum of one to a maximum of three), describing the subject of the paper.

Papers exceeding the maximum length will be automatically returned to the authors for revision.

Font

Submit files in Times New Roman, 12 pt.

Please do not insert running headings. When not necessary, avoid bold-face, capitalization, etc.

Paper structure

- **Title of the paper:** centered at the top of the first page.
- **Name of the author(s):** align left, under the title.
- **Abstract:** the abstract should provide the context or background for the study and should state the purpose, basic methodology and procedures, main results and principal conclusions. It should emphasize new and important aspects of the study or observations. It should not exceed 150-words.
- **Keywords:** identify 1-3 keywords that capture the main topics of the paper.
- **Text:** preferably the paper should be divided into the following sections with headings: Context, Objective, Methods, Results, and Conclusions.
- **Notes and References:** all references should be placed at the end of the text. Only numbered text notes will be accepted (a source must be referred to in the text by an apex), and no separate bibliography should be included.

- i.e. “The decision was at first left with the scientific community.² Everyone agreed ...”

References must include complete information: author(s), article or book title, name of journal or book, date/year, page numbers for articles or a section of a book, complete names for institutions and organizations rather than abbreviations or acronyms. If the source is a book or conference proceedings, place of publication and publisher are required. If more than three authors, give the first three authors followed by *et al.*:

- i.e. G. Rossi, “Studio di un caso”. In: A. Verdi *et al.* (eds), *Analisi dell'opinione pubblica*, Einaudi, Milano, 1987.
- i.e. P. Greco, “Towards a Mediterranean model of science communication”, *Jcom*, 3(3), 2004. Retrieved Dec 6, 2005; available at: <<http://jcom.sissa.it/focus/foc030303.pdf>>

- **Author's biography:** it should include the author affiliation and contact information. It should be no longer than 80 words.
- **Figures and tables:** all figures and tables need to be referred to at the appropriate points in the text. Capitalize all references to tables and figures (i.e., “...number of users is greater as shown in Figure 1”, or “See Table 2 below”). Use only standard abbreviations and units. A heading and a short, explanatory footnote must accompany each illustration.
